#### **Synopsis**

But twelve-year-old Joey Grosser doesn't have time for games. Not since his pa dropped dead and left Joey, his ma and his little brother with nothing but bills and a money-losing corner grocery store in Montreal.

Joey vows to earn money any way he can to get his family out of their dump of a neighborhood, where rats nibble on babies' ears and the air smells like liver and onions. But by summer's end, Joey is worse off than when he started and turns to the wrong man for help.

As Joey's bar mitzvah quickly approaches, one decision will determine whether he lives long enough to celebrate becoming a man – and to watch Jackie Robinson make baseball history.



# **CONFLICT RESOLUTION**

There can be major conflict that runs through the entire story or minor conflict that come up along the way.

Conflict is essential to driving the story and building tension. The big question is how will the conflict be resolved?

#### **HISTORICAL FACTS**

#### Jackie Robinson and the Integration of Baseball

In October 1945, Jackie Robinson became the first black man to sign a contract to play in modern organized ball. The Montreal Royals were the Triple A-farm team for the Brooklyn Dodgers, and Branch Rickey, president and general manager of the Dodgers, thought Montreal would be the safest place for his "great experiment" of breaking the color barrier. Things were far from easy for Robinson – he endured threats, abuse, racial slurs...discrimination at every turn from the first day of spring training, but he promised Rickey he would ignore it all and focus on the game. It didn't take long for Robinson to prove his worth as a player with the 1946 Royals. And one year later, he would make his debut for the Brooklyn Dodgers and break the color barrier of Major League Baseball.

While Robinson was the first to sign and all eyes were on him, he was not the only black player in the 1946 minors. There was Johnny Wright and later Roy Partlow, both with the Royals but demoted soon after they were hired. In the United States, Roy Campanella and Don Newcombe played with the Nashua Dodgers. They would join Robinson and the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1948 and 1949, respectively.

#### The Third Solitude

Within a city already divided into Anglo-Protestant and French-Catholic lay a "third solitude": Montreal Jewry. Although Jewish Montrealers settled in various parts of the island -- including the posh neighborhoods of Westmount and Outremont, as well as the working-class Mile End and the Plateau – experience, history and the Yiddish language remained a common bond.

# **Degenerate Art**

In July 1937, The Nazi regime held the Degenerate Art Exhibition, featuring works that were considered modern, abstract, blasphemous or created by Jewish artists. The idea was to show works that were deemed corrupt and a plot against Germany. Some of the most famous artists the world has ever known had works hung at the exhibit, including Marc Chagall, Paul Klee, Max Beckmann and Wassily Kandinsky.

# The Voyage of the SS Saint Louis

In May 1939, 937 passengers boarded the SS St. Louis in Hamburg, Germany, and set sail for Havana, Cuba. When they arrived, very few were allowed to disembark. The ship's captain, Gustav Schröder, sailed north, but both the United States and Canada refused to take the remaining 907 passengers. Captain Schröder had no choice but to return to Europe. Although the passengers split among Belgium, France, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands, 254 would die in concentration camps.

#### **The Four Freedoms**

Norman Rockwell's iconic set of four paintings for the *Saturday Evening Post* was his way of contributing to the American war effort. Each painting was named for the four basic human freedoms as voiced by then president Franklin Delano Roosevelt: *Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Religion, Freedom from Fear* and *Freedom from Want*. In fact, the paintings were such a success, they became part of a travelling exhibition to sell war bonds and stamps; some \$133 million was raised.

# The Red Pony

John Steinbeck's classic coming-of-age story is about Jody and the love he has for Galiban, the red pony his father gives him. Though Jody cares and trains Galiban with the help of ranch hand Billy Buck on their Northern California ranch, Galiban falls ill and dies, and Jody must learn just what it means to grieve, to forgive and to grow up. *The Red Pony* was written in 1933 and appeared with three other short stories in the book bearing its name in 1937.
